28 Oct - Letter from Anarchist Prisoner Jorge “Yorch” Esquivel

Mexico: Statement from Mexican anarchist prisoner, Jorge “Yorch” Esquivel, arrested on December 8, 2022, and sentenced to seven years and six months in prison on fabricated charges.

MORE:

How’s everyone? I’m a bit stressed because I haven’t been given any information related to my appeal. The courts continue on strike and they haven’t given me any response. I also want to mention that the judge who is ruling on the appeal is the same judge who sentenced me, so I don’t hold out much hope for the appeal. However, we have the writ of amparo which will be ruled upon by another court. For that I hope they take a couple years off my sentence at least, or if it’s possible, absolve me of all charges because there is no evidence against me and yet they still convicted me.

I ask that you all continue supporting me with political pressure, in whatever way you all can, with letters, artwork, collecting goods I need here in prison, material to make handcrafts like thread and beads, colored markers, coloring books, mica paper, colored pencils, magazines, books, recipes, clothes, underwear, socks, clothes for the cold, etc. Whatever you can acquire can be left at La Clandestina: Espacio de Encuentros in Santa María la Ribera in Mexico City.

I also want to thank the compas from the Los Angeles Anarchist Black Cross and the Mexico Anarchist Black Cross, for the solidarity and effort to include me in the international list of political prisoners of the Anarchist Black Cross Federation.

That is all for now. We will continue resisting for the time that is necessary. I’ve already been here almost two years. Whenever they schedule the appeal hearing, I hope you all can continue supporting me from your trenches. I send you all a combative embrace.

Let the walls of all prisons fall! Free the political prisoners!

28 Oct - What Is Prisoner Support?

A movement with the goal of crushing a ruling oppressive system will have to learn that people in it will be exposed to repression from the government.

This can sometimes mean that you, or your friends, are forced into prison. To take care of ourselves, our comrades, our movement, and to continue fighting to achieve our goals, it is therefore important that we practice prisoner support.

Prisoner support can look very different. Among other things, because we may have different needs when we are imprisoned. But also, because we who help do it in different ways. Therefore, it is not possible to easily define exactly what prisoner support is, how it is done. However, there are some recognizable features of prisoner support.

As prisoner supporters, it is fundamental to show solidarity with your comrade in prison. You can do that by getting in touch and check what needs the prisoner have. For example, you can write letters to the inmate (guidelines for letter writing differ between different institutions, so check which rules apply in the prison you are writing to). Then think about what you want, and can handle. You can, for example, write a

letter only on a single occasion, to show that the inmate is not forgotten, alone. You can also start a longer relationship, by writing letters. You can hear what the inmate wants.

In addition to letter writing, there are other ways to help prisoners. For example, for those who have the opportunity, and if it is allowed by the prison, you can contribute with money and things that the inmate needs, e.g., send books to the prisoner. If necessary, you can also help the inmate's friends and family, outside the prison. Several families need both emotional and financial support. In cases where you are not able to donate financially, you can contact the nearest Anarchist Black Cross, check if you together can start a fundraiser for the family. You can also be there for the inmate when they are released, helping in different ways when the comrade leaves prison is often important.

With prisoner support, we cannot only help inmates but also strengthen comrades outside prisons. All comrades in the movement should know that if they themselves are imprisoned, they will not be alone or forgotten, on the contrary. In this way, prisoner support contributes to strengthening the entire movement for the liberation of animals. No one is alone. No one is free until all are free!

29 Oct - Freedom for Miguel Peralta!

Mexico: Communique from Miguel Peralta's support crew and family announcing a hearing at the Supreme Court.

To the people, organizations, and collectives who have shown their solidarity and accompanied the struggle for the unconditional freedom of Miguel Peralta, Indigenous Mazatec of Eloxochitlán de Flores Magón.

We want to announce that on Wednesday, November 6, 2024, the Supreme Court of Justice of the Nation, in Mexico City, will rule on the appeal 6535/2023 in the case of our compañero Miguel Peralta.

This hearing comes almost ten years after a sociopolitical conflict exploded in the community of Eloxochitlán de Flores Magón, on December 14, 2014, catalyzing a wave of repression, criminalization, persecution, and imprisonment against members of the community assembly of Eloxochitlán de Flores Magón, including Miguel Peralta.

Miguel Peralta was arrested in April 2015 on fabricated charges, following the events in December 2014. In October 2018 he was sentenced to 50 years in prison. Following an appeal, and nearly a month on a hunger strike, in October 2019, he was absolved of all charges and released.

Over two years later, on March 4, 2022, his freedom was overturned by the Third Criminal Court in Oaxaca. He was again sentenced to 50 years in prison and a warrant was put out for his arrest. Since then, Miguel has been displaced from his community, having to live beneath political persecution.

In October 2023, the Supreme Court took on an appeal in Miguel Peralta's case. On November 6, 2024, they will discuss and rule on the appeal. This court date comes after a previous hearing on June 19 where justice Loretta Ortiz Ahlf postponed the ruling. We hope the postponement was a good sign for Miguel and the Mazatec community of Eloxochitlán de Flores Magón.

The five justices ruling on the case are Loretta Ortiz Ahlf, Juan Luis González Alcántara Carrancá, Jorge Mario Pardo Rebolledo, Ana Margarita Ríos Farjat, and Alfredo Gutiérrez Ortiz Mena. On November 6, the court has the opportunity to put an end once and for all to the persecution against Miguel Peralta.

In theory the justices must study the case from an intercultural perspective, taking into account the sociopolitical context of the political persecution. Doing so will show the dynamics of political power at play in the case, and the unequal relationship between those being persecuted and those doing the persecuting.

We know a decision from the courts won't be sufficient in bringing justice to Miguel Peralta and the community of Eloxochitlán de Flores Magón. Ten years of state and cacique terror has unraveled the community fabric, separating community members from their families and territory, establishing division, mistrust, and fear among the population. The state itself is responsible for the criminalization, imprisonment, and persecution of community members of Eloxochitlán de Flores Magón, including Miguel Peralta. Justice will only come in the self-activity of the community, in the healing of relationships, in the reweaving of the community fabric.

We demand that the Supreme Court dictate absolute freedom for Miguel Peralta on November 6, allowing him and the community to forge their own path toward justice in conditions of freedom.

We call on everyone, wherever you are, in whatever capacity you have, to again show solidarity with Miguel Peralta and the struggle for his freedom. And not just for him, but for the community of Eloxochitlán and all Indigenous communities facing repression and criminalization at the hands of the state.

29 Oct - New Political Prisoner: Caleb Freestone

Caleb is a 29-year-old from Florida who was convicted of tagging the outside of a fake pregnancy crisis center in the wake of the Dobbs (abortion rights) decision being overturned.

He and his codefendants were originally charged with the FACE Act and faced over 10 years in prison. He was sentenced to 1 year and 1 day in prison in September 2024 for the vandalizing of the South Broward Pregnancy Help Center; the Life Choice Pregnancy Center, and the Heartbeat of Miami Pregnancy Help Medical Clinic. The spray-painted messages on the buildings included "Jane's Revenge," "Your time is up"

and “We are everywhere.” He is going to serve his time at FCI Yazoo City in Mississippi. For more information see linktr.ee/sfl_arc

November 5th - New Political Prisoner Amber Smith-Stewart

Amber is a 25-year-old Nicaraguan- American from Miami Florida. They received a 30-day sentence in federal prison for their participation in tagging fake pregnancy centers in Florida in the wake of the Dobbs (abortion rights) decision (Roe v. Wade being overturned). According to Amber, *“Two things turned me into the person I am today, the murder of my mother by the hands of prison system and the summer of 2020. This is a reminder to always remain ungovernable.”*

29 Oct - Two people arrested for mink release charged with eco-terrorism

Federal Bureau of Investigation officials say two Massachusetts residents involved in the Oct. 19 release of hundreds of mink in Northumberland County are tied to anarchist groups in New England.

Pennsylvania State Police also believe one was paid \$50,000 to come to Sunbury and release the animals.

According to an amended criminal complaint filed by Stonington state police, Christopher Legere, 25, and Cara Mitrano, 27 are connected to “Firehouse,” and “Collective A Go Go,” anarchist communes located in Worcester, Massachusetts, law enforcement officials said. Police say the pair released 683 minks from Richard Stahl Fur Farm, outside of Sunbury, early on Oct. 19.

Troopers say they intercepted Northumberland County Jail phone calls where Legere claims he was promised \$50,000, according to a criminal complaint.

District Attorney Michael O'Donnell amended the charges and has added felony eco-terrorism, burglary, theft by unlawful taking, criminal mischief, corrupt organizations, and misdemeanor counts of agricultural trespass on posted land, recklessly endangering another person, accident involving damage, loitering and prowling at nighttime and conspiring in unwarranted detention, according to court documents.

Police began an investigation into the second incident on the farm in a little more than a year when they were called to the farm early on Oct. 19. Police spoke to members of the Stahl family, who said they took pictures of the suspect's vehicle as members of the fur farm attempted to block the road so the suspects couldn't leave, police said.

The suspects tried to flee the scene once, troopers said, and when they were located, the vehicle they were in accelerated toward one of the Stahl's vehicles, damaging it before fleeing south on Airport Road, troopers said.

The Stahls followed the vehicle and watched it turn onto Seven Points Road, then onto Captain Bloom Road, where one of the Stalls saw a backpack, work gloves and a dark sweatshirt being tossed from the fleeing vehicle, troopers said.

Ralpho Township police became aware of the vehicle and made a traffic stop soon after the incident, troopers said. The vehicle was towed from the scene, police said.

A hand-drawn map and directions were seized from Mitrano's front pant pocket, troopers said.

After executing a search warrant signed by a Northumberland County judge, troopers said they recovered a wire-cutting tool, two stickers that read “policy proposal” depicting a police car on fire. Also found were work gloves, a lockpicking kit, a map and directions, with an “X” on Airport Road where Mitrano and Legere were going to park and an arrow illustrating where to walk through the woods to the mink farm, police said.

Both are being held in lieu of \$150,000 cash bail and will appear in front of Sunbury District Judge Rachel Wiest-Benner on Tuesday morning for a preliminary hearing.

This was the second time in just more than a year the fur farm was struck by vandals. Thousands of mink were released in September 2023.

O'Donnell would not say if the two incidents were related.

In the 2023 incident, a press officer with the North American Animal Liberation Press Office said he believed the farm was targeted. According to the website, animalliberationpressoffice.org, an anonymous letter was posted to the site claiming responsibility for the attack.

On the 19th of October, Cara and Celeste were arrested accused of green 638 minks from a fur farm. They are facing an array of charges including eco-terrorism and burglary. This case is continuously being updated, so we will be keeping you informed as things evolve.

For now, there are two main things you can do to support our two incarcerated comrades.

Firstly, you can donate to their bail and legal fees fundraiser. The bail has been set to 150k USD each, and their support group estimates legal fees to reach up to 100k, so they are trying to put together 400k USD. This is a huge amount of money, so if you can donate, that would be amazing, but if you can organize a fundraising event, screening, food share or otherwise any other form of fundraising that raises the profile around your community, that would be extremely beneficial.

Secondly, you can write letters. We are still working out the best method to get love to Celeste, but Cara has a prison address you can use to send your love. Please, DO NOT TALK about the case. DO NOT TALK ABOUT ANYTHING ILLEGAL! Instead, write to Cara about their interests, which include anti monogamy, family abolition, relationship anarchy, chess, memes, crafting, bike trips and collective living projects.

30 Oct - Leonard Peltier Update

On Monday October 28, 2024 Leonard Peltier was hospitalized. Please read on for the latest updates.

It is imperative that Leonard Peltier receive an emergency medical transfer to a facility such as FMC Rochester.

Leonard's attorneys have submitted an urgent medical transfer request based upon the medical analysis of the independent medical physician who visits Leonard regularly at USP Coleman I. His attorneys have also repeatedly warned the U.S. Federal Bureau of Prisons (BOP) of the very risks which caused Leonard's hospitalization, but have been ignored. As USP Coleman I cannot appropriately address Leonard's medical needs, Leonard should be transferred to a medical facility equipped to meet his medical needs. A medical

transfer to FMC Rochester not only ensures adequate medical care, but proximity to Leonard's homelands and family, which is consistent with BOP policy.

Enough is enough. Mere apologies are insufficient. On World Political Prisoner Day, Wednesday, October 30th, the Committee encourages Leonard's supporters and all justice loving people to contact Senators Jon Ossoff and Amy Klobuchar, who serve on the U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee, and demand that Leonard Peltier receive an urgent medical transfer. Chile: Below, we extend the open letter of werken Rafael Pichun Collonao, from the community module of Temuco prison.

We are about to take a new October 12, once again, another year, exactly this is the reawakening of the deep anti-colonial feelings of millions of men and women of the continent of Abya Yala, mainly our indigenous peoples who are in the maximum oppression and domination by the colonial states.

Our wallmapu, which is at the end of this continent under occupation by the Chilean-Argentine states, we have thousands of years of existence and hundreds of years of struggle against invasions. First by the Inca empire, later by the Spanish empire.

All these conflicts of a warlike nature were resolved with resistance and great agreements on the part of our people. With kimun, our futakecheyem knew how to resolve with great wisdom, in many cases, with bloodshed, they knew how to keep our territory free, with the most important values of the Mapuche: the value of life and our freedom.

Thus, historically our people have had the ability to speak in difficult situations and times. Reaching agreements with the enemy and so, it was that with the Incas and the Spaniards, they agreed on limits and borders among other diplomatic agreements. How can we not remember the thirty treaties that took place in the past, including some that are in force internationally? So today I ask myself...How do you protect a border? It is worth asking it.

We Mapuche always respond with agreements of respect, negotiations and above all with words. The border of peace and respect was crossed, and the limit was broken by Chileans and Argentines in the 1860s, 1870s and 1880s with the occupation of our territory through arms in a gigantic genocide. I ask myself again: Should we speak as Mapuche of occupation or colonization?

The differences could be very clear, if we think that colonization is a process closed to a historical moment and we see occupation as something transitory. Colonization reached as far as the Biobío River, but the military occupation that began 150 years ago left our people suffering the worst cultural and natural devastation.

They tell the story from the colonizer's point of view; that Abya Yala was practically discovered, that those of us who lived here did not reach the quality of human. An example is that among their stories they say that the first man who saw two seas at the same time (Pacific and Atlantic) was a man named "Vasco

Núñez” from a summit in Panama. With some irony I wonder, would our ancestors be blind? Well, that is their policy, to make us believe ourselves inferior, to keep us blind, deaf, mute and as subhumans.

The process of assimilation and forced disappearance of our culture and language that is still being applied by the states against our Mapuche people during these 150 years of occupation that begins with the so-called pacification and desert campaign, led our people to the most extreme poverty, with the theft of more than 95% of the territory of Wallmapu.

This October 12 does not have much importance since our Lof fight day by day to keep us alive and standing, rebuilding us and expelling the forestry industry and large landowners that have occupied a large part of our territory.

The forestry industries have literally destroyed our mapu, with them they have left only drought, deforestation without mawidantu and menoko.

They have plundered our territory, and only 3 or 4 multi-millionaire families have lined their pockets.

Their wealth has multiplied in the last 50 years after the promulgation of Decree Law No. 701, created in the time of the dictator Pinochet.

2,500,000 hectares were planted with pine and eucalyptus monoculture, which cover our territory today.

Our Lof have had to assume the struggle for territory and autonomy, in the frontal struggle against the capitalist system and the colonial state, it is here where the states put all their strength against our struggle, they let fall all their power in complicity with the rulers, regardless of political color, they use all their powers and jurisdictions (legislative, The executive and judicial branches) as true guardians in protection of the interests of big capital, they follow the initial mandate which is to make us disappear as a people.

Wallmapu is besieged by a military and paramilitary presence, which act at the limit of their own laws, persecute the weichafe, raid communities permanently, violently interrupt schools in the presence of Mapuche children inside. There are a large number of Mapuche political prisoners with high sentences, normalizing preventive detention as a way of disassociating people from their territories.

Even so, we shout to the world that we are still alive and fighting for our liberation, because wallmapu will be free forever, because it is our duty and a right to rebel. Today, October 12, 2024, is an almost unimportant but bitter day for me. I am serving 6 months in political prison, along with a handful of brave young weichafe. We assume the true struggle of our people.

5 Nov - Fallout From “Unsurprising Fact”

UK: We recently published a letter from Toby Shone, titled "Unsurprising Fact." Brighton ABC has written about the fallout from the widespread distribution of Toby's writing.

MORE:

As the result of Toby Shone having giving the text “Unsurprising Fact” to Brighton ABC, he had a visit from Counter-Terror Prevent duo Ian Turner and Mick McCormack on the morning of October 21st. He was issued 3 administrative sanctions and is now on Basic IEP regime, which means no television and only £5 a week to spend. The sanctions were for: writing an open letter to Joe Black at Brighton ABC on October 13th. [“Unsurprising Fact” was dictated over the phone]; repeated phone calls to a friend during which she put him on speaker phone so that he could also talk to others in the room; and for speaking disrespectfully about staff including his Probation Offender Manager person Clare Ashton in a conversation with another contact in September. The first two people have been removed from his phone list.

NB: Toby is due to be released on November 13th, 2024, having served his full sentence. This is just the latest (and hopefully the last) vindictive move by HMP Garth’s “anti-terror bureaucrats” attempt to punish him during his final days at “His Majesty’s pleasure.”

These first four designs were all painted by Oso Blanco after he had been captured in 1999. Proceeds from the sale of these greeting cards will benefit children in the autonomous Zapatista zone of Chiapas, Mexico, and on reservations here on Turtle Island.

"I did all this art under extreme duress. For years I was trying to make this happen, I was living in a literal hell on Earth where I did these pieces (SMU Lewisburg). Sometimes I couldn't get paper, other times no pencils. Every day was violence, every day was conflict with staff and prisoners. Sometimes I had crazy cellies. I was living in an absolute horror. Often times we got pepper sprayed, we got shook down. My pieces got ripped or damaged or stolen by staff. I would have to struggle, REAL struggle, that most people on the streets couldn't survive, let alone imagine. But I never gave up!

I continue to believe in Children's Art Project (CAP). This art was done by hand, not by some computer. The toil and the suffering and the high cost of sending out my art via certified Mail is seriously no joke. I'm not sitting at some resort in Washington state, relaxing, doing this art with all the best art supplies and resources. I'm literally doing this with extreme difficulty and the bare minimum. I think people must respect the fact that they could probably not even survive in the environments where I completed this art.

So, please, honor the Children's Art Project, so that we may help the children in Chiapas, where I've risked my life many times in Mexico sending old army surplus, bullets, medicine, horseshoes, vitamins for pregnant women (folic acid), veterinary medicine for horses, you name it. I didn't just fall off the potato wagon and become a Political Prisoner, I earned this through my great sacrifice, through life and death, through turmoil. Being shot by the police and the FBI and having police dogs sicced on me during this case, ripping me apart, all for the humor of the FBI and Albuquerque police.
