

300 DUMDUM BULLETS AMONG CARTRIDGES CAPTURED IN W. VA.

STRIKERS FAIL TO RESUME WORK, 40,000 REMAINING OUT IN OHIO

Extent Men Will Obey Order Canceling Walkout May Not be Known For Days; Operators Accept Invitation to Wage Conference; Miners Accept, But Reject Former's Offer, Suspecting Trap by Operators.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Nov. 12.—Careful examination of the ammunition seized with nine military rifles at Dawes, W. Va., by deputy sheriffs today disclosed the presence of some 300 soft nosed dum-dum bullets among the regular cartridges, it was announced at Gov. Carnwell's office this afternoon.

An earlier dispatch said the seized arms were consigned to a mine living in Dawes.

Kanawha field coal miners did not obey the orders of their leaders and return to work early today. Only four of the 200 mines in the district began work and these with comparatively small forces.

Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 12.—Reports from all mining districts in Ohio today were that none of the 40,000 miners had returned to work.
