BOBIES OF VANZETTI AND SACCO TO BE DISPLAYED IN FOUR OF EASTERN CITIES

First Will Lie in State at Defense Headquarters—Copies of Death Masks of Both to Be Distributed.

TWO RADICALS FOLLOW MADEIROS TO CHAIR

Attorneys Abandon Efforts to Gain Respite Only When Executions Start—Cries of Sister and Wife Arouse Neighborhood—Prison Is Heavily Guarded.

BOSTON, August 23.—The bodies of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti are to be taken in specially constructed caskets through the city of the East. This was announced by the Sacco-Vanzetti defense committee today.

First they are to lie in state at the committee headquarters, on Hanover street, in north end of this city. When this will be the committee was unable to say at noon, as they had not been informed at that time when the bodies would be turned over to them by Medical Examiner Magrath. The visits to various cities might extend as far as Chicago, it was added.

The body of Celestino Madeiros, who was executed with them at the State prison early today, will be delivered to a New Bedford undertaker. This is at the request of his mother.

The Charlestown district and all other parts of Boston were quiet today. An echo of the last-minute demonstrations in sympathy with Sacco and Vanzetti came with the arraignment in the Municipal Court of pickets arrested in front of the statehouse.

Death Masks to Be Made. Mrs. Glendower Evans, who has been active in the Sacco-Vanzetti defense, said today that death masks would be made of both men and many copies distributed. She visited the Northern Mortuary, where the bodies were taken from the State prison, but Medical Examiner Magrath said he was too busy at that hour to admit her or her companion, William Gropper, a New York artist.

It was learned today that among the personal effects left in the prisoners' cells were letters written by Vanzetti to his father in Italy and to Henry Ford and by Sacco to his mother and to the defense committee. They have not been made public.

Sacco and Vanzetti died calmly shortly after midnight in the electric chair at the Charlestown State Prison protesting their innocence of the crime, affirming their belief in anarchy and refusing the benefits of religion.

In his native tongue Sacco shouted, "I live anarchy" as he seated himself in the death chair. "I am an innocent man" were among the last words of Vanzetti.

Two men were convicted of killing Frederick A. Parmenter, paymaster, and Alexander Berardelli, guard, and robbing them of \$15,776.51 on a street in South Braintree, Mass., April 15, 1920.

Follow Madeiros to Chair. Celestino Madeiros, sentenced for the murder of a Wrentham bank cashier, preceded to the chair by a few minutes the two men whom he had attempted to save by a confession that he was present at the crime of which they were convicted, and that neither Sacco nor Vanzetti was there.

This confession was used as the basis for a motion for a new trial, but was denied. Up to the hour set for the execution, and even later, the seven-year legal struggle to save the lives of Sacco and Vanzetti had continued. When every court and legal resource had been exhausted, defense attorneys still strove to find new means of gaining a reprieve for the condemned men. Police attorneys hastening by automobile to Williamstown to lay an appeal for stay before Justice George W. Anderson, the United States supreme court turned back only when they heard by telephone that Madeiros and Sacco already had been executed and that the fate of Vanzetti was a matter of minutes. Then at last the defense counsel, finally admitted defeat.

From his cell in the death house, Madeiros, the first of the two to be executed, walked the few feet to the chair in the execution chamber without show of emotion. He walked steadily and seemed indifferent to his fate. He entered the chamber 2 minutes 45 seconds after midnight, and at 9 minutes 35 seconds past the hour he was dead. He spoke no word and gave no sign of recognition of any of the witnesses.

Sacco Says Farewell. In a few moments the second death house cell was emptied and Sacco walked to the execution room. Pale, but apparently strong and vigorous, he stepped to the chair and as he sat down shouted in a ringing voice, "Viva L'Anarchia."

While the straps were being adjusted he spoke in English in a more moderate tone. "Farewell, my wife and child and all my friends." After a pause, he looked around at the silent witnesses of the State and said, "Good evening gentlemen. My final words, spoken as we have said, were 'Viva L'Anarchia.'"

Once more two guards left the chamber and returned with Vanzetti. He was the most collected of the three and seemed calm and dignified. He spoke no word and gave no sign of recognition of any of the witnesses.

SACCO PROTESTS CAUSE STIR IN MANY FOREIGN COUNTRIES

Police in Capitals Abroad Kept Busy Dispersing Mobs and Guarding United States Property.

By the Associated Press. NEW YORK, August 23.—Demonstrations in behalf of Sacco and Vanzetti were staged before and after their execution in various European and South American cities.

At Geneva, manifestos after marching on the United States consulate and being beaten off by the police broke windows of the great hall of the library of the League of Nations Palace.

From the palace the crowds went to the American agency of two picture theaters showing American films and began to attack it. Streams of water had to be played on the demonstrators before they could be dispersed. In the course of the struggle with the police some one fired a shot, killing an on-looker.

The Geneva correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Co., London, in his version said 5,000 persons took part in the rioting, attacking and looting.

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HOOPER TO REMAIN IN CABINET DESPITE PRESIDENTIAL BOOM

Secretary Will Retain Post. Although in Forefront of 1928 Possibilities.

Commerce Head Seen AS LEADING G. O. P. FIELD Observers View Chances as Particularly Good, With Favorable Turn in West.

By G. GOULD LINCOLN. Herbert C. Hoover, Secretary of Commerce, has no intention of resigning from the cabinet to become an active candidate for the Republican nomination for President.

Mr. Hoover, who has just returned to Washington from the West, is giving his attention to the work of his department. He is not talking politics. He is not establishing a "Hoover for President" organization.

All this, however, does not mean that Mr. Hoover is not very much in the picture of the next national campaign. He has ardent supporters throughout the country who are ready to go to work for him at the slightest sign, and some of them without any sign whatever.

Soon Must Take Stand. Within a few months at most Mr. Hoover must either assent or decline to allow his name to go before the Republican voters in a number of States where presidential primary elections are held for the purpose of instructing the delegations to the Republican national convention, due to meet next June.

Mr. Hoover is regarded in many quarters as one of the strongest, if not the strongest, prospective candidates for the Republican nomination. The situation gives promise of clearing in such a way as to make the nomination of Mr. Hoover extremely probable. In the farm States of the West, where there has been opposition to Mr. Hoover because of his known enmity to the McNary-Haugen farm sales bill conditions are better, with prospects of good crops, and even that the corn crops may be satisfactory.

Change in California. Furthermore, the political situation in California, Mr. Hoover's own State, has changed since he left in 1920, when Mr. Hoover's name was presented to the Republican national convention.

At that time Senator Hiram Johnson was the choice of many of the old Bull Moosers and Progressives for the Republican nomination. He dominated the party and the national convention, and he went to the national convention with the delegation in his vest pocket.

Today, however, the suggestion that Mr. Hoover be a candidate for President has brought a real response in California. Not a few of the men who have supported Senator Johnson in the past are known to be strongly in favor of placing the State delegation solidly back of Mr. Hoover.

John Johnson next year comes up for re-election to the Senate. He wants to be re-elected. Life in the Senate is not a bad thing, and he has renounced all idea of becoming again a presidential candidate. His fallacy in 1920 and 1924 gives him a reason for advancing his candidacy again. If he wishes to return to the Senate, Senator Johnson would have to leave the State and go to Washington.

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FIVE FOUR GUilty ON ATTACK CHARGE

Maryland Negroes to Be Sentenced Today for Assault Near Oxon Hill.

UPPER MARLBOROUGH, Md., August 23.—Five young negroes, three of them under 21 years of age, faced a possible sentence of death here today when a jury in the Prince Georges County Court found them guilty of an attack on Miss Albertine Rice, 22 years old, of 1422 N. street, Washington, who, with her sister, John M. Buckler, 3246 Prospect avenue, Washington, was dragged from an automobile parked near Oxon Hill the night of July 20. The defendants will be sentenced later this afternoon.

The findings of the court were announced by Chief Judge W. Mitchell Diggs of the seventh judicial circuit. Each was charged with the crime of kidnapping, and one of them would probably receive the extreme penalty.

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RIGHT TO MARKET SITE'S QUESTIONED

Roberts Holds Transfer to Treasury Must Have Approval of Congress.

HOLDING that the District would not be authorized to turn the Farmers' Market property over to the Federal Government for any other purpose without congressional legislation, George M. Roberts, superintendent of weights and measures, recommended to the Commissioners today that the Treasury Department be informed it is impossible to state definitely when the property can be vacated.

The superintendent suggested that the Commissioners explain to the Treasury Department, however, that they expect to submit to Congress in December a recommendation for a new Farmers' Market, together with an application for authority to vacate the present space, which the Federal Government is anxious to get possession of in order to begin work on the new Farmers' Market.

The Commissioners probably will take up the recommendations of Mr. Roberts at a board meeting Friday here answering the letter received last week from James A. Wetmore, supervising architect, in which he inquired how soon the farmers' market could be vacated.

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
