

Entente War Aim Only Plunder, Debs Tells Socialists

Declares "Not All the Jun-
kers Are in Germany"
in Ohio Speech

Defies Sedition Law
"I Am More Guilty Than Rose
Pastor Stokes," He Says
at Convention

CANTON, O., June 16.—Eugene V. Debs, three times Socialist candidate for the Presidency of the United States, addressed the closing session of a three-day convention of the Socialists of Ohio here to-day. Emphatically denying that he had repudiated the party's position on the war, which he declared the Socialists must stand more firmly than ever for their principles, Debs, after paying tribute to the Socialists who have gone to the front for the sake of their principles, said that the war was the same as those of the Central Powers—plunder.

A crisis in America, similar to that which placed the Bolsheviks in power was predicted by Debs. J. J. Fried, alleged Cleveland Socialist, said Debs had approved a plan for American Socialists' cooperation with the Bolsheviks by sending an army of 100,000 men to their assistance. During Debs' address Federal operatives seized and held for investigation fifty-five young Socialists who could not show draft classification cards.

In his public speech, Debs declared himself to be as guilty as Mrs. Rose Pastor Stokes, who was recently convicted of violating the espionage act. He promised that he would not try to establish his innocence if arrested on a similar charge and added: "The United States, under the rule of autocracy, is the only country in the world that would send a woman to jail for ten years for exercising the right of free speech."

"Not All Junkers in Germany"
Socialists, the speaker cried to his audience must fight militarism wherever it is found. "Don't imagine for a moment," he declared, "that all the Junkers are confined in Germany. They want our eyes focused on the Junkers of Berlin so we'll not see those in our own country." "You are in a crucible to-day," Debs continued. "If you permit yourselves to be driven out of the party you are not the stuff of which revolutionists are made."

Imprisonment of Socialists who have not feared to speak of their views on the war, Debs pointed out, would help the Socialists. "In a country fighting to make the world safe for democracy," he said, "it is dangerous to express an honest opinion. I must be careful what I say."

Socialists Demand An Early Peace in Wisconsin Platform

MILWAUKEE, June 16.—Socialists, in state convention here to-day, adopted a platform, the principal plank of which declares for "an early, general, lasting and democratic peace—without forced annexations or punitive indemnities and with the right of all nationalities to determine their own destiny."

Other planks oppose "the establishment of European militarism in America" and favor "freedom of speech, freedom of press and freedom of assembly."

Emil Seidel, former Mayor of Milwaukee, was nominated for Governor.

Debs Faces Arrest for His Speech at Canton

CLEVELAND, June 16.—United States District Attorney E. S. Wertz said to-night if Eugene V. Debs was correctly reported as declaring at today's Socialist convention in Canton that the aim of the Allies in this war was plunder, he would bring the matter before the Federal grand jury here tomorrow for violation of the espionage act.

\$2,000,000,000 Thrift Drive Will Be Launched Here To-day

Campaign to Be Carried Out on Two Distinct Lines;
Every Resident in Greater City to Be Asked
to Aid U. S. With Pennies

The spendthrift habits of New York will be attacked to-day when the drive opens for the city's share of the \$2,000,000,000 which the nation will be asked to save and invest in thrift stamps this year. During the campaign, which will end on June 28, the entire population will be asked to enroll itself in a league of honorable parsimony.

A great, revolutionary change in the city's mode of living is expected to take place at once. The days of lavish spending have passed, and the old-fashioned wastrel is doomed to a sudden loss of caste. The popular, respected citizen in the future will be the man who carefully counts his pennies, and buys only the bare necessities of existence. People who skimp a little on their eating, who look a trifle shabby when they go about the streets, who reduce all social expenses to a minimum, and who live on a bare subsistence, will be the new aristocracy of patriotism. The drive to induce everybody to hang on to their quarters and invest heavily in the government's Thrift stamps will be conducted by the combined forces of the third Liberty Loan and war savings stamp committees. Flying squadrons of stamp salesmen will penetrate the uttermost corners of the metropolis, the thousands of booths and stations will be opened and the rest of the former loan machinery set to work. The activities of the great salesmanship and educational organization the city has ever known.

Two Lines of Campaign
The work of the campaign will be carried out along two distinct lines. All business and professional, trade, religious, racial and social groups will be resolved into a huge savings society. Members become active workers as well as private investors, and wear a special button as a mark of distinction. Those of the city's millions who fail to affiliate themselves with the united societies will be asked for individual savings pledges. A house-to-house canvass conducted by the Democratic and Republican organizations will reach a greater part of the population, and both workers in department stores, theatres and other public places will see that all the rest have a chance to sign the thrift pledges.

Friday, June 28, has been designated by the Secretary of the Treasury as National War Savings Day. The drive will gain momentum up through this final day, when New York is expected to reach a substantial oversubscription of its quota. Appealing to every resident in the boroughs to save and buy stamps, Frederick J. McDonald, one of the Mayor's Committee on National Defence, said yesterday that New York was going to have "the greatest Fourth of July in history" this year. One hundred and twenty-five thousand persons are to march in the parade.

There will be thirty-five groups, representing every nationality in the city, but the United States flag is the only one that will be carried. Two hundred floats will tell the stories of the fights for independence waged by the various nationalities. The Department of War and the Navy Department will send floats to participate in the parade. Others will depict the activities of the Shipping Board and the War Industries Board. The army, navy and merchant marine will contribute contingents. "Boats will show the ancient glory of the country, the early days of the Christian era, the oppression of Turkey, the desolate Syria of to-day and the regenerated Syria of tomorrow."

More than five hundred members of Irish organizations met yesterday at the Catholic Club to plan their part in the parade. Supreme Court Justice Victor J. Dowling will head the Irish division. Thirty thousand Zionists will participate.

New Mission From Mexico Proposed

The United States government, in an endeavor to strengthen the understanding which has grown up with Mexico since the advent of the commission of Mexican newspapermen, probably will invite a similar delegation of business men to visit the United States in the near future.

This was the report current here yesterday when the newspapermen bade the city farewell and started for Boston, where they will be entertained for twenty-four hours by the Boston Chamber of Commerce.

Still enthusiastic, the Mexican editors were looking forward to what is still before them with something like apprehension. They will pass to-day in Boston, Tuesday in Albany, Wednesday in Buffalo, Thursday in Detroit, Friday, Saturday and Sunday in Chicago. They then will jump to Minneapolis and St. Paul, to the Yakima Valley, Seattle, Portland, San Francisco, Los Angeles, San Antonio and then to Laredo, where they will reach Mexico. In all of the cities named, the commission will be the guests of the local Chambers of Commerce.

N. Y. Bankers to Meet
ATLANTIC CITY, June 16.—The New York State Bankers' Association will hold its twenty-fifth annual convention on Thursday and Friday at the Hotel Traymore. There also will be individual meetings of the private and investment bankers' section, national bank section, state bank section, trust companies' section and savings bank section Thursday forenoon.

The convention proper will open at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. Deputy Governor R. H. Treman, of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, and S. H. Beach, president of the Savings Bank Association of the State of New York, will be among the speakers.

William P. Milburn, former Assistant Secretary of the Treasury of the United States; Pierre Jay, of New York City; B. H. Fancher, vice-president of the Fifth Avenue Bank, New York; George Skinner, State Superintendent of Banks, of New York; James M. Beck, former Assistant Attorney General of the United States; William Arnold Shunklin, president of Wesleyan University, and George Wharton Pepper, of Philadelphia, will be among other speakers at the sessions.

Sinn Feiners Lose Fight for Marshal Of Loyalty Parade

Cohalan Party Routed by
Faction Led by J. J.
O'Connell

Name Justice Dowling
"Loyal" Irishmen Declare
They Are Fighting the Cause
of All the Allies

United States Marshal Thomas D. McCarthy and John J. O'Connell, together with a few other fighting Irishmen, have routed the Sinn Fein forces in a battle over the election of a marshal for the Irish-American section of the loyalty parade on July 4.

When Mr. O'Connell, who was the floor leader of the Progressives at the national convention in Chicago two years ago, and Marshal McCarthy and their assistants got through, the Cohalan party, led by Justice Cohalan's court officer, Roderick J. Kennedy, and his secretary, John McTigue, were hot-footing it away from the verbal shrapnel which filled the Catholic Club Saturday night. As a result, Supreme Court Justice Victor J. Dowling was elected grand marshal and an executive committee named with power to fill any vacancies which may occur between the Fourth and the Fourth.

J. I. C. Clark, of the Mayor's Loyalty Parade Committee and a former president of the Friendly Sons of St. Patrick, presided at the meeting. The anti-Sinn Fein, who hate all the Irishmen O'Connell and his followers of his type stand for, knew they would get a square deal with Mr. Clark in the chair. They were fearful, however, that the Cohalan party would try to "put something over" on the gathering.

These loyal Irish—using the phrase as it is known in Ireland—were taken by surprise when John G. O'Keefe, treasurer of the Friendly Sons of St. Patrick, moved that Patrick Conway, of the Irish-American Athletic Club, be elected grand marshal. The thought that Mr. Conway might be unwittingly used as a stalking horse for some one else that the Cohalan party wanted.

Mr. O'Connell arose at this point and said that before going ahead he wanted to know if the loyalty parade was to be made up of races whose loyalty had been assailed, and if so he wanted no part of it. He held the true Irishman did. Assured that this was not the case, he continued: "This is the first time in American history since the Civil War that the Irish here have had to justify their loyalty to the mass of the American people. But we need only point to the personnel of the navy, which is at present made up of 40 per cent of Irish and the army, which contains 35 per cent of Irish, to show that the disloyalty is confined to a few who disgrace our race. The peculiar antics of some of our people here and in Ireland have alienated—and properly so—the sympathy of America. These disloyal fellows pray to God for the success of the American flag and at the same time pray to the same God for the defeat of British arms."

Must Fight for All
"This is criminally vicious. We Irish must devote our whole mind and heart and hand to bringing about the success of American arms, and in doing that we must fight as loyally for England as for America or France or Belgium, for we are all one now."

Then Marshal McCarthy moved for the appointment of a nominating committee of five, which was carried, and the following were named: Edward Hamilton Daly, John G. O'Keefe, Chris Toher Murry, John J. O'Connell, and Dr. Constantine McGuire. The last named was a young surgeon when the Franco-Prussian war started, and he joined with the French to fight the Hun, and at the conclusion of hostilities was made a Commander of the Legion of Honor.

These five then reported that they agreed on Justice Dowling, and he was elected.

American Jews Urged To Foster Ideals

Plans to foster the ideals of Judaism in America were discussed yesterday at a joint session of the United Synagogue and the Jewish Women's League, in the Jewish Theological Seminary, 531 West 124th Street. About thirty delegates of Jewish organizations were present.

Professor Louis Ginzburg, acting president of the United Synagogue, in an address urging the solidarity of American Jewry, expressed opposition to all separatist movements among the Jews. He said: "The vitality of Jewish ideals and doctrine is never revealed as strongly as in moments of great crises. 'Man-kind is now learning the old Jewish truth that a God all merciful is a God unjust, and further, that no heart is pure which is not passionate. We must learn to hate before we are able to love. In these times of distress and sorrow American Israel does not know parties or classes.'"

Nathan Straus made a brief address appealing to the delegates to support the Zionist movement. He said he was planning an early trip to Palestine.

Mrs. Solomon Schechter, president of the Jewish Women's League, told of the work her organization is doing to further Jewish education among women.

Only 98 Harvard Seniors
At Baccalaureate Service
CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 16.—The annual Baccalaureate sermon by President A. Lawrence Lowell, of Harvard University, was delivered in Appleton Chapel to-day under circumstances indicative of the part the college is playing in the war.

Only ninety-eight seniors from an original freshman class of 720 were present, and of them one-fifth were in uniform.

Blot Out the Hyphen, Franz Sigel Urges

Loyalty Week a Good Time to
Do It, Says Leader of Friends
of German Democracy

Franz Sigel, president of the Friends of German Democracy, who recently was assailed by Mrs. Oliver Cromwell Field for making use of the word "German" in connection with an organization of citizens, yesterday declared himself against the hyphen and for the descriptive phrase "Americans of German origin." Loyalty week is a good time to start the substitution, he suggested.

"Let us use the term 'Americans of German origin,'" he said, "and apply the name 'German-American' only to those few in number who may now and then raise their disloyal heads to be dealt with as they deserve." "So far as the term 'German-American' is descriptive of a citizen's birth or descent it is unobjectionable. It is then merely an abbreviation of 'American of German birth or ancestry.' If it is used, however, to indicate any political allegiance to Germany, it is improper. There are some who failed to mark this distinction and thus they failed to live up to their duty or to the pledge they gave when they were naturalized. It is to them I speak, that they may take thought on their subject and so thinking may modify their future conduct and become real American citizens."

177,000 Miners Needed

Plea for Exemption Cites
60,000 Called to Colors

Commenting upon the necessity of exempting coal miners from military service, the current issue of "The Black Diamond" says the government coal needs indicate the necessity of obtaining 93,000 more miners, and estimates the number that have been called for military service at 60,000.

"This means," it continues, "that with the same number of working days at the mines this year as last, the shortage of bituminous miners now measures 153,000. The present shortage of anthracite miners is 24,500."

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Dr. Day in Pulpit Becomes Prophet About Profiteers

Commissioner of Markets
Addresses West End Pres-
byterian Congregation

Dr. Jonathan C. Day, Commissioner of Markets, occupied the pulpit yesterday morning at the West End Presbyterian Church, Amsterdam Avenue and 105th Street, where he talked on "Profiteers and Profiteers."

Through a misunderstanding the subject of Dr. Day's discourse had been billed in advance as "Profiteers and Profiteers," but profits, he explained, were the last thing he had in mind. What concerned him was the romantic figure of the Prophet, silhouetted, solitary and aloof, against the sweep of the ages.

"The prophets of old," he said, "are the men who advanced humanity, and they were not professionals. Profiteers are profiteers live for what good the world can do them; prophets for the good they can do the world."

Then Dr. Day told of an incident he had witnessed during the early days of the war in a street car in this city. A complacent looking man, he said, was talking to a friend of the struggle in Europe. "If this war continues a couple of years longer," Dr. Day said, "the man remarked, 'I'll retire from business; I'll have enough to last me the rest of my life.'"

A little woman in black, the speaker said, rose from her place at that and deliberately slapped the complacent one in the face.

"You he!" she cried. "I have had two boys shot in the trenches. Three more belong to the French army, yet you sit here and gloat and talk of quitting business. It is such men as you that cause humanity to blush for the race."

"That woman," continued Dr. Day, "spoke as a prophet; the man as a profiteer." And the speaker went on to show how difficult has been the path of the genuine prophet ever since the days when the shepherd Amos was denounced by the men of Samaria and

Israel, "tolling in ease on their couches of ivory."

"When anybody speaks on behalf of mankind instead of on behalf of the institutions which fatten off mankind," Dr. Day told his hearers, "that man is a disturber, and is upbraided as such by the men rolling at ease."

In conclusion, the Commissioner traced the careers of Lincoln and Grant, whom he held up as true prophets of the new day.

Serbian "Victory" 529 Years Ago Is Celebrated Here

The 529th anniversary of the Battle of Kosovo, at which the Serbs held back the Turks from Europe at the cost of their own nationality, was celebrated yesterday afternoon at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine by a special service, at which the Very Rev. Howard C. Robbins, dean of the cathedral, and the Very Rev. J. Krainovich, dean of the Serbian Church, delivered addresses.

There were other signs of the alliance between America and the nation that has lost its land for a second time in an effort to save civilization.

Just before the service began a detachment of United States troops marched into the cathedral from the west entrance, their flag, carried ahead, gleaming in the half-light of the great church. Another flag advanced from the east entrance to meet it—the flag of Serbia, followed by officers and men of the gallant little army.

A minute later the organ pealed out "Onward, Christian Soldiers," and the choir entered, chanting the magnificent hymn.

Dean Robbins, who took for his text, "Out of the depths have I called to Thee, O God," drew a parallel between the ancient Hebrew nation and the oppression suffered by Serbia.

"Do not these two nations, Israel and Serbia, stand together to-day in their fight from out the depths?" he asked. "Each stood in the way of conquerors seeking to rule the world; each withstood nobly, but each was overcome. Still each has that faith; that hope that has never faltered, never strayed. One word we have to-day for the friends of

Serbia, and that is of gratitude to the nation that for five centuries kept alive the torch of faith in its future; that has ever voiced the determination that people must be free."

"Kosovo Day," said Dr. Krainovich, "marks the fall of the state of Serbia in June, 1389. Before that time our ruler wore the title of Emperor of the Serbs, Greeks and Bulgars. That battle crushed the nation, but the soul stood out for all that was best. The people began to sing of the defeat. Not all has been given up to the Turks, for the soul remained."

This pious gathering assembled here to-day is for the solemn observance of the manifestation of the power of the infinite being through the human ideas of truth, beauty and goodness emanating from the humility of the southern Slavonic race."

Father O'Brien Goes to Army
The Rev. Gregory O'Brien, pastor of St. Pius's Church, 145th Street and Willis Avenue, The Bronx, who was appointed chaplain at Camp Gordon, Georgia, left yesterday to assume his new duties.

Father O'Brien had served the St. Pius parish for ten years. He was born in New York forty-six years ago and was ordained in 1893.
