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Analysis of Contents

The following is an analysis of the articles appearing in this issue:

1. Page one contains an article "Cuban Exiles Hurl Acid at Crowd in New York", which concerns an incident that occurred at the Sunday, April 15, 1973 session of the Conference on Political Alternatives in Puerto Rico and the Caribbean, "sponsored by UEPAC, the Puerto Rican student organization at Queens College...". It alleges that during the afternoon of that date, while the Cuban Ambassador to the United Nations was speaking, violence broke out during which a bottle containing acid was broken against the balcony. The group blamed for the incident is described as being known as "ABDALA".

2. Page two contains an article "We Can Support African Movements", containing the statement that the information set forth was prepared in response to requests from persons "interested in providing concrete material support for the peoples of Angola, Mozambique, and Guinea-Bissau." Listed are medicines and medical equipment; clothing; synthetic textiles and blankets; and food concentrate.

The article notes that materials could be sent to the TWWA Office at 346 West 20th Street, New York, New York, where they will be packed and shipped to the proper authorities.

3. Set forth on Page three is an interview with VILMA ESPIN by "Prensa Latina" "Feminism Puts Forth Only Partial Solutions". It is said the interview is reprinted as part of a special series of articles

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commemorating the 20th anniversary of the attack on ~~Moncada~~ Garrison, 7/26/53 "and to show our solidarity with our sisters in revolutionary Cuba."

An insert gives personal history on VILMA ESPIN described as a member of the Central Committee of the Cuban Communist Party.

4. "On the Job", Page four. This column appears regularly and concerns domestic workers. Set forth is an interview with an unidentified domestic worker.

5. Page four also contains an endorsement by the TWWA of the necessity for domestic workers to organize.

6. Page five contains an article "White Cop Kills Black Child", which concerns the killing of 10-year old CLIFFORD GLOVER on 4/28/73, in Jamaica, Queens, New York, by New York City Patrolman THOMAS J. SHEA. It sets forth the demands of the "Brown and Black Community and other New Yorkers concerned about justice" in the case. The article contains the initials "F.B." as the author.

7. An article "May Day: Celebrated" appears on Page five which describes the celebration held in honor of the 87th anniversary of International Worker's Day. It said a march and rally was held on 4/29/73, at Randall's Island, which was attended by approximately 500 people and that representatives of the Black Worker's Congress, Puerto Rican Revolutionary Worker's Organization, United Farmworkers, and the East Coast Panthers, spoke at the rally. Musical selections were presented by BARBARA DANE.

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The article noted that the TWWA interviewed some black and brown women who attended. The article bears the initials "S.K.".

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Page five carries an announcement of "A Black and Latin Workers Conference of New Jersey", 7/28, 29/73, Newark, New Jersey . Information can be obtained from the "Black and Latin Workers Conference", Post Office Box 8038, Newark, New Jersey.

N.Y. 8. "Rising Prices Hurt Women Most", Page six, by FRANCES ~~BEAL~~. This article notes that Third World people are suffering because of the present economic policies. It notes that Third World women are especially vulnerable, being the last hired and first fired. A major cause of the inflation is cited as the war in Southeast Asia. The resulting rise in taxes, along with inflation, are listed as the means whereby the Government, in collusion with big corporations, makes people pay for military expenditures. It calls for women to organize and fight against the monopolies that control the nation.

Page six also contains a list of six names under the caption "Write Our Brothers and Sisters in Prison". These names are as follows:

10. An article, "In the Market", on Page seven, is described as a "talk with some Third World consumers in supermarkets".

11. "Albanian Women Advance", on Page seven states that the women of Albania are making continuing advances in such things as education, the professions, and in the social and cultural life of the people.

12. Pages eight and nine, the centerfold of the paper, contains a Spanish and an English translation of an article "The Puerto Rican Women in the Struggle for Liberation". Several women active in this activity in Puerto Rico dating from the 19th century are discussed. The Spanish translation is by one, MARIA ~~ZAYAS~~. *NY*

13. Page ten is headed "National News in Brief". Among the items mentioned on this page are the following:

It is mentioned that the Sixth Contingent of the Venceremos Brigade (VB) had returned from two months in Cuba. It said the contingent had 102 members which included two members of the TWWA. The item described the construction which the contingent worked on in Cuba and some of the places visited.

Another item comments on the Committee to Defend Carlos Feliciano, and states that it is beginning an intense campaign to end prosecution against FELICIANO by means of massive pressure upon District Attorney FRANK HOGAN to drop all charges.

A third item mentions that a four-day celebration marking the 20th Anniversary of the Attack on the Moncada Barracks in Santiago, Cuba, on 7/26/53, will be held in New York City (NYC), beginning 7/26/73. This celebration described as Expo-Cuba, it is said, "Is being sponsored by a coalition of individuals and organizations - the 20-26 Committee". The celebration will be held at the

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Martin Luther King Labor Center, Local 1199, 310 West 43rd Street, NYC. It said that for additional information, a call could be made to the Committee for 20-26, at 924-2484.

14. Page eleven contains an article over the initials A.C., and is concerned with "junk" food.

15. Page twelve contains a Spanish translation of ANA CELIA's article "Exiles Hurl Acid".

16. Page thirteen contains an article in both English and Spanish, on "The Guerrilla Theatre". This article notes that the Puerto Rican Women's Workshop of the TWWA at Hunter College, following three months of weekly consciousness raising sessions, decided that it would be a good idea to try and communicate through this theatre, some of the things they had learned about the triple jeopardy facing Third World Women, namely racism, sexism, and imperialism. The article notes that anyone interested in joining the guerrilla theatre group should write to them at 346 West 20th Street, or call ANA CELIA, at 360-5264.

17. Page fourteen contains an article "Women Who Struggle", printed in both Spanish and English, and described as a statement by The People's Student Front of Costa Rica, Central America.

18. Page fourteen also contains an article on African Liberation Day, and the march and rally in NYC, on 5/26/73. It said that at the rally, several speakers stressed the need for solidarity with Africa and continued support of the liberation struggles.

It said that among the speakers were representatives from PAIGC (African Party for Independence of Guinea-Bissau and Cape Verde), OAU (Organization of African Unity), and the Black Panther Party.

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19. Page fifteen contains a film review of the movie "State of Siege", by LENORE ~~KARIN~~. NY

20. Page fifteen also contained an article "Brazilian Women Used as Guinea Pigs", by RONALDO ~~LAGE~~. It accuses doctors of using Brazilian women as guinea pigs in testing the effects of a new contraceptive pill.

21. The back page of this issue contained an article captioned "2-4-6-8, Who's the Creep at Watergate?", by ANA CELIA.
