Re New York letter to Bureau, 8/30/72 analyzing the July-August, 1972 issue of "Triple Jeopardy".

The July-August, 1972 issue of "Triple Jeopardy", which is self described as the "ideological organ of the Third World Women's Alliance (TWWA)", on pages 10 and 11, announced that a group are planning to start the first West Coast chapter of the TWWA. Post Office Box 3065, Berkeley, Calif., was given as the address, and calls could be made to CHERYL at 415-652-9954.

b2 b7D [redacted] on 10/16/72 advised that the subscriber to [redacted] was located at [redacted] Calif. The telephone number is nonpublished, and was established in 4/72. b7C

Records of the Berkeley, California Post Office on 10/19/72 set forth that Post Office Box 3065, Berkeley, Calif., was rented on 5/4/72 by [redacted] whose business was TWWA. Her residence was set forth as [redacted] Other addresses were set forth as [redacted]

b7C San Francisco indices contain reference to a [redacted] but at this stage of the investigation it is not known whether or not they are identical.

On 10/20/72, [REDACTED] (SF file [REDACTED]), reported that on 10/14/72 an anti-war demonstration and march was sponsored by the October 14th Coalition, an ad hoc group. This march was held in San Francisco.

The main rally was held in Golden Gate Park, San Francisco. Among 13 organizations participating in the demonstration was the TWWA of Berkeley, Calif. The main speaker at this demonstration was former U. S. Attorney General RAMSEY CLARK.

A single page leaflet captioned "Third World Women's Alliance, Post Office Box 3065, Berkeley, California", was distributed at the demonstration. Part of this leaflet was an invitation to Third World sisters to join every Wednesday night (except the first Wednesday of each month) at 639 Alcatraz Ave., Oakland. Informant was unable to provide further information.

Page 2 of this issue contains the program for November, 1972, of the TWWA of Berkeley, California. Also set forth under the caption "Car Pools" are the names of TONI (TH 1-6383) in Berkeley and VICKIE (564-8915) in San Francisco. It asks that sisters, who have access to cars, call the above numbers in order that they might get more women to attend the sessions. This announcement also states that in order for TWWA to grow there is a need for sisters to help in the organization's development. Three numbers are given as numbers to contact for any questions. These numbers are 928-7318 in San Francisco, 652-9954 in Oakland, and 632-4533 in Oakland. (San Francisco has already identified the subscriber to telephone number [REDACTED] b7c

Page 2 of this issue also contains an announcement of the Venceremos Brigade (VB) which is described as "An Anti-Imperialist Political Education Project, in Solidarity with the Cuban Revolution." This announcement states that the recruitment for the Sixth Contingent to work in Cuba in the Spring, 1973, began on October 8. It adds that for applications the following should be contacted:

The Venceremos Brigade Post Office Box 4705, San Francisco, California, telephone 658-2647 and EDDIE DEMMINGS, Apartment 4, 61 West 87th Street, New York, New York. The deadline given for the applications is December 5.

1. An article "Third World Anti-war March, November 4" which states that on November 4, a coalition of "progressive anti-imperialist groups" which was composed of Asians, Blacks, Puerto Ricans, and workers and students sponsored a march and rally which was organized around the three following principles:

Support the 7-Point Peace Plan of the Provisional Revolutionary Government of the Democratic Republic of South Vietnam, End National and Racial Discrimination, and End Attacks on Working People.

It said that many Third World and working people joined in the march and that as far as Third World participation went, it was one of the most successful political actions within the past year.

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It is noted that the rally was held at Lewisohn Stadium with the following as speakers:

2. "Students Continue Struggle". This article refers to the April, 1969, take-over of a building by black students on the campus of Voorhees College in Denmark, South Carolina, to protest the type of education being received at this "Episcopalian-sponsored school". It said that as a result of this, several "brothers" were arrested, are now in prison and are facing prison sentences. It adds that "the brothers whose names we do have" have requested that comrades write to show their support. The names of these persons are given as CECIL "AL" RAYSOR, ALVIN EVANS, MICHAEL MOORE, OLIVER FRANCIS and JAMES EPPS. It adds that they can be written to in care of the Voorhees Seven Defense Committee, Route 2, Box 331, Denmark, South Carolina in care of Mrs. RAYSOR.

The article adds that throughout the State of Louisiana Black students have expressed their dissatisfaction with the kind of education that they are receiving and that one of the universities faced with strikes is Southern University.

3. "Suckin' Haiti's Blood", which article criticizes the Hemo Caribbean Company described as a US-owned company, for purchasing blood from impoverished Haitians to sell to hospitals in the US. The article quotes an unnamed "staff member" at the non-profit NY Blood Center as stating that it is difficult to justify the actions of Hemo Caribbean on either social or medical grounds.

4. ~~USA~~ "Union Promotes Racism". In this article the "International Ladies Garment Workers Union (ILGWU) is criticized for promoting ads critical of Japanese goods made for sale in this country. It says that the ads indicate that Latin Americans may lose their jobs to other parts of the world.

The article accuses the ILGWU of promoting racism because the garment industry has many Third World Workers, and says that the ILGWU is trying to turn Blacks and Puerto Ricans against the Japanese. It adds that the ILGWU should focus on the real culprits, American businessmen and corporations who make the contracts with foreign manufacturers.

This article also states that "Asian-Americans for Action" have put out a call for all groups and individuals to help to protest this racist onslaught. ~~USA~~ ILL MICH B. Atlanta, Ga

5. ~~USA~~ "Organizing Domestic Workers", the author of which is listed as DOROTHY BOLDEN. In this article she recounts her history of work as a domestic, and in other capacities, from Atlanta, where she was born and lived, to Alabama, Chicago, Detroit, and New York, and back to Atlanta. She claims that the job she liked best was that of a domestic and that in 1968, she began organizing maids. She goes on to describe her work in this area. (No copy of this article is being furnished to Atlanta; however, if Atlanta requests, a copy will be furnished that office.)

~~USA~~ 6. ~~USA~~ "Sudanese Women Struggle", whose author is shown as CAROLYN LOBBAN. In this article LOBBAN notes that the oppression of Arab women is maintained by Islamic society values of male supremacy and that little information concerning the struggles of Arab women is available. She goes on to discuss the Woman's Movement in Sudan and points out that the first group of organized women grew out of the Communist Party (CP) in Sudan, which party was formed in 1946 as was the Sudanese Woman's League. In 1951 three Communist women were among the seven women who founded the Sudanese Women's Union, the successor to the Woman's League.

The article claims that the aims of the Sudanese Women's Movement are the same today as at its founding: 1. The emancipation of women through obtaining equal rights and equal duties, 2. To struggle for international female freedom and peace through Socialism.

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7. ~~"The Pill and Cancer"~~, which goes on to discuss the types of mastectomy available to women. USA

8. An article printed in Spanish on abortion and facts that should be known about it.

(A similar article was set forth in English in the September-October, 1972 issue of "Triple Jeopardy".)

9. ~~"Welfare History II"~~, by ~~CAROL LYNN~~, which USA LKA article discusses the history of welfare beginning with the depression of the 1930's and comments on the programs established by President FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT to deal with unemployment and relief.

On concluding this article LYNN states that it deals with one way in which the Capitalist System develops programs to restore mass order and at the same time to discourage militants. She adds that the next article will examine the manipulation of a surplus labor market and the role played by welfare recipients USA

10. ~~"Help From Sisters"~~ the credit for which is given to the TWWA in Oakland, California. It sets forth the conditions that exist in the San Bruno County Jail, a jail housing from 50 to 60 women. It decries the lack of medical care in this prison and states that in January, 1972, a group of women from the community formed the T.W.O., The Women Outside, to determine from those in prison their immediate health problems. The article refers to the campaign promises of Sheriff RICHARD HONGISTO, that, if elected Sheriff, the community could become more involved in the jails. It calls for programs to enlarge the limited recreational facilities and to provide classes which would aid women in obtaining employment when discharged. It challenges Sheriff HONGISTO to make good on his campaign promises to allow the community access to the jails.

11. "16 Year Old Black Sisters Write On 'The Family'" . This article, which is unsigned, describes the concept of the "old family" as an institution that holds the slaves of Capitalism in line. The children of a family are described as the slaves but as persons who are now rebellious and realize that the "old family" was taught under the Capitalist System and attempts to follow its dictates.

Children are described as the "real power" in the old and new families who can either give in to the Capitalist

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System or struggle against it and slowly destroy it.

The article comments that the need is for young men and women who will oppose the "old family", even though it may result in death or imprisonment. It states that the old oppressive family must not be allowed to rise again.

12. "Prison Struggle"

This article concerns the case of RICHARD "DHORUBA" MOORE, who is on trial in New York City for allegedly shooting two New York City policemen in May of 1971. It claims that the District Attorney is trying to win the case against MOORE with fabricated evidence. It calls for support of MOORE by the people, for coming to the courtroom as a supportive observer, for writing letters to newspapers and radio stations to have them cover the case and for sending money to KISHA SHAKUR, 430 Clinton Avenue, Apartment 401, Brooklyn, New York, "so that we may pay for the expenses we incur while working on this defense committee."

KISHA SHAKUR is identified as the wife of RICHARD MOORE.

13. Poem "To JULIA DE BURGOS" by JULIA DE BURGOS. JULIA DE BURGOS is described as a Puerto Rican poetess who died in Harlem Hospital in 1953.

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The Editorial in this issue "Four More Years" is concerned with the reelection of President RICHARD NIXON. It claims that "Most of us (i.e. Third World radical women) didn't vote and we were accused of supporting NIXON, the one man who has brought more death, racism, hatred, poverty and pollution to the entire world in the last four years than any 'dictator' or 'murderer' has ever been capable of." It adds that most of the things predicted by the MC GOVERN supporters, if NIXON won the election, will come true.

The Editorial states that they do not support NIXON but must state what they are against and what they want to replace the present system with and how it can be done. It calls for basic changes in Government, for more equal distribution of the world's wealth, control of institutions such as schools and businesses by people who are engaged in them, non-exploitive relationships between women and men, the end of racism, and feeling for each person's worth with pride in their language and cultural differences and equal participation in everything that affects their lives. It says that these are only some of the things that Socialism and Communism stand for.

It notes that the Democratic Party is not committed to the above principles and that MC GOVERN and his supporters cannot bring them about. Therefore, "many revolutionary organizations" are urging a boycott of the elections for several reasons. Among these is the statement that "the real task ahead is to raise consciousness everywhere and join in an international struggle, build a worker's party to create our new view of society, our new woman, and the new man."

The Editorial closes with a call for the creation of a new society in unity with all the world's progressive women.
