On February 16, 1971, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that the name of [REDACTED] telephone number [REDACTED]

b7D [REDACTED] Source added that the TWWA has approximately 200 members and is not an exclusively black women's organization.

The SNCC was formerly known as the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee and was founded in 1960 during the period of civil rights activity in the South. The organization advocates the use of force to achieve revolutionary goals and the destruction of the capitalistic system of government in the United States.

The January 13, 1971 edition of "News Day", a daily newspaper of general circulation published in Nassau County, New York, [REDACTED] contained an article on page 4A concerning Women's Liberation groups in the Metropolitan New York area. One of the individuals interviewed was Frances Mary Beals, described as a radical member of TWWA, who declared that TWWA women are fighting against their triple exploitation in society, that is, capitalism, race and sex; TWWA is nationalist, socialist and feminist. The Women's Liberation Movement (WLM) is made up of loosely structured groups throughout the country which have been publicly described as advocating complete equality for women.

On March 6, 1971, the second source advised that the subject, on the above date, attended a demonstration at the Women's House of Detention, Eighth Avenue and Sixth Avenue, New York City, which was sponsored by the Youth Against War and Fascism (YAWF).

YAWF is the youth group of the Workers World Party (WWP).

The WWP was founded in 1959 by individuals who disagreed with policies of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). The WWP dissidents advocated unconditional support of the Soviet Union and the building of a revolutionary party geared to the overthrow of capitalism. More recently the WWP has called for peaceful solutions to Sino-Soviet disputes.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.
